The AskERIC Service for K-12 Educators

The latest addition to the ERIC family is quickly gaining renown as a leading Internet resource for education information. AskERIC, a project of the ERIC Clearinghouse on Information Resources, was begun in October 1992 to provide question answering, help, and referral to K-12 educators through the Internet. The hallmark of AskERIC is the presence of a human intermediary to negotiate and respond to all questions posted to the system. AskERIC has grown steadily since its inception, and now an average of 200 to 250 electronic mail inquiries are received weekly.

While anyone may post a question to AskERIC, services are specifically targeted to members of several state and regional networks where AskERIC is offered as a "menu option." Targeted networks include TENET (Texas), SENDIT (North Dakota), NYSERNet (New York), Learning Link (New York), and Community Learning Network (British Columbia). Formal arrangements with other networks are expected to be added in the future.

In addition to responding to individual inquiries, AskERIC also offers a growing file of information sources through an FTP/ Gopher site. Called the AskERIC Free Library, this site includes news and information about AskERIC, select ERIC Digests in full text, prepared ERIC searches on current topics, resource guides, lesson plans, a list of popular "Qs & As," and the archives of some education-related listservs. Introduced in February, 1992, the AskERIC Free Library now logs over 5,000 inquiries each week.

To send a question to AskERIC: email to askeric@ericir.syr.edu. To access the AskERIC Free Library through Gopher: (1) Gopher to ericir.syr.edu, and (2) enter Port #70. To FTP to the AskERIC Free Library: (1) log into your local host, and invoke the FTP program, (2) enter ericir.syr.edu as the remote host computer name, (3) enter anonymous as username, and (4) enter your email username as password (e.g. tomt@machine.edu).

ERIC Copyright Withdrawn

In response to public comment requested in November, 1992, the Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) has withdrawn its permission allowing the contractor that produces the ERIC database to establish copyright, and has postponed indefinitely the implementation of a new user-based pricing structure for the database. ERIC Director Robert M. Stonehill, in an April 9, 1993 letter, summarized the reactions of approximately 40 respondents, comprised mainly of college and university librarians and adminstrators and national organizations including the American Library Association. According to Stonehill, most were specifically opposed to copyrighting the ERIC database, and almost as many were critical of the higher prices they might have to pay to use ERIC online or on CD-ROM. A small number of respondents supported ERIC's user fee proposal.

Internet Access to ERIC

Internet users can access the latest five years of the ERIC Database through SUINFO, a campus information system at Syracuse University. Searchable fields include author, title, descriptor word, descriptor phrase, and abstract. Instructions:

- 1. Telnet acsnet.syr.edu (or 128.230.1.21).
- 2. At > prompt, type SUINFO.
- 3. At ENTER TERMINAL TYPE prompt, type VT100.
- 4. Bypass the USERID and PASSWORD prompts with the tab key.
- 5. At the COMMAND prompt, type SUINFO.
- 6. When prompted, type Y (yes) to continue.
- 7. Select ERIC through the menus, or type ERIC to enter directly.
- 8. Follow screen instructions to search.
- 9. To end the session, type LOGOFF.
- (Note: Whenever MORE or HOLDING appears in the lower right corner of the screen, hit the HOME, ENTER, or CLEAR key to advance.)
